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

Council builds kiosks for Pinetown taxi rank traders

INFORMAL traders in Pinetown's bus and taxi rank are getting new, improved trading facilities to let them trade and safely store their goods and equipment after business hours.

This R2.5-million project by the City's Business Support Unit (BŠU), involves building a storage facility opposite the new trading shelters. So far 28 trading kiosks have been built, with more planned.

There are hundreds of traders operating from the rank.

The BSU said this would eliminate unsightly informal trading structures Cambridge Butchery.

Cambridge Butchery donated temporary trading space to the informal traders who had been affected during the building of the kiosks.

The kiosks are expected to area

appealing and attractive to buyers and reduce conges-

tion on the busy pavements. BSU's Thulani Nzama said: "The traders have been looking forward to the project since consultations were done in the last financial year.

"The kiosks are being built behind the Cambridge Butchery and it will help traders do business in a more professional manner.

Safer

"Their goods would be stored in a much safer environment," he said.

Thamsanqa Fakazi, Chairman of Hlanganani Traders Association, which represents traders at the rank, thanked the council for improving conditions.

"These facilities have proved a revelation. However, we are continuing to engage with the Business Support Unit to provide more shelters.

"We have about 260 traders

with permits in Pinetown who are still desperately in need of improved shelters," said Fakazi

However, Margaret Hadebe, who trades chickens near the the Pinetown rank, was worried the new facilities had no space for her live chickens.

"I just hope this could be considered. I'm not the only trader who sells chickens. But we are grateful for this positive attempt by the Business Support and everyone else involved," said Hadebe.

Patrick Mncube, of the BSU, said: "We are working with all parties concerned, and they have been supportive and helpful.

"This project has also created job opportunities for builders," he said.

More trading shelters are planned for the Weber Industrial area, near Hammarsdale, to improve informal trading conditions.

Focus on climate change

THE council's executive committee (Exco) has tasked City Manager Michael Sutcliffe with compiling a report on the adverse effects of climate change in Durban.

The move by Exco was prompted by recent big seas and high tides that recently devastated a sizeable area of Amanzimtoti beach on the South Coast.

Mayor Obed Mlaba, who presented a report to the committee on the damage caused by the unusual wave action to Toti, said eThekwini and other municipalities needed to brace themselves for the effects of climate change.

He said eThekwini had thrice this year witnessed natural phenomenon that could be linked to climate change.

"This has been discussed at a national level where it was agreed that all spheres of government needed to tackle the challenge of climate change," he said.

Mlaba was referring to a national cabinet debate in May this year on climate change. At that debate President Thabo Mbeki said the country was gearing up to build new power stations that relied on coal.

He said the effects of climate change on sustainable development would be severe unless something drastic was done to combat

global warming.
"We are determined to ensure all levels of government implement integrated plans on this matter," said Mbeki.

DA caucus leader in eThekwini, Cllr John Steenhuisen said the city's Dr Debra Roberts had compiled an excellent book that explained climate change and its effects in simple terms.

"The book speaks on the effects of climate change and I am hoping it can be made available to the public so that they can better understand climate change," he said.

The South African National Biodiversity Institute (SANBI) paints a grim picture of the effects of climate change in the country and globally.

Research by the institute shows climate change could lead to provinces such as Mpumalanga, Limpopo, the North West, KwaZulu-Natal and even Gauteng becoming malaria zones by 2050.

SANBI said that the effects would not only be limited to humans but would lead to at least 100 species of plants becoming extinct.

The damage caused by the waves at Toti, which washed away more than 50m of the main beach, has been estimated at R8-million.
